


Hon. Dr. Ela Gandhi (born 1 July 1940), is a South African peace activist and former politician, and served as a Member of Parliament in South Africa from 1994 to 2004, under the first President Nelson Rolihlahla Mandela, the first democratically elected president of South Africa. She aligned with the ANC and represented Phoenix of Inanda in KZN, also serving on the Welfare, and Public Enterprises committees, amongst others. She has B.A. degree from the former Natal University and a B.A. in Social Science with honors from UNISA. She was a social worker with the Verulam Child and Family Welfare Society for 15 years and the Durban Indian Child and Family Welfare Society for 5 years.

During apartheid, Gandhi was banned in 1975 from political activism and subjected to house arrest for a total of nine years. She worked underground for an end to the system of apartheid. She was a member of the UDF, and was Vice President of the Natal Indian Congress. One of her sons was killed during the struggle against apartheid.

Following her stint in parliament, Gandhi developed a 24-hour program against domestic violence, founded the Gandhi Development Trust, and serves as a member of the Religious Affairs Committee, and oversees a monthly newspaper. She also chairs the Mahatma Gandhi Salt March Committee and the Mahatma Gandhi Development Trust, and served as the Chancellor of Durban University of Technology for several years.

Amongst Ela's awards, count the Community of Christ International Peace Award (2002); the Padma Bhushan award from the Government of India (2007); the Shanti Doot International Award (2013); the Pravasi Bharatiya Samman from the President of India in 2014; and was also honoured as a veteran of *Umkhonto we Sizwe*.

Prof. Dr. Clayborne Carson is Emeritus Professor of His-tory Stanford University, USA, and was director of the Martin Luther King, Jr., Research and Education Institute. He has also directed the editing and publication of the Martin Luther King Jr. Papers, having joined the Civil Rights Movement leaders at a young age. He has a BA (1967) and MA (1971) in History from UCLA, and completed his PhD on Stokely Carmichael and the SNCC, in which he also participated in the 28 August 1963 march. He was a staunch participant in the Anti-Vietnam War movement, with one of his seminal research focuses, also being the importance of grassroots political action within the African-American freedom struggle.

As Professor of History, Carson lectured for more than 40 years, at Stanford University, on U.S. and African American History, Martin Luther King Jr., Malcolm X, the SNCC, the Black Panther Party, and seminal aspects of the civil rights struggle. He is a member of the American Historical Association (AAHA); the Organisation of American Historians (OAH); the Social Science History Association (SSHA); the Association for the study of Afro-American Life and History (ASAALH); and the Southern Historical Association. He is too, a regular guest on TV and on radio stations in the US.

Amongst several books, count his *In Struggle: The SNCC and the Black Awakening of the 1960s* which was awarded the Frederick Jackson Turner Award in 1982, and was historical advisor the film, *Freedom on my Mind* which was nominated for an Oscar. Following a request from Coretta Scott King, Carson

also directed the project that edited and published The Martin Luther King Jr, papers, over a twenty year period.

Amongst the co-edited and co-authored books are: The Eyes on the Prize Civil Rights Reader (Penguin, 1991); Malcolm X: The FBI File (Caron and Graff, 1991); American Voices: A History of the United States (1998); The Autobiography of Martin Luther King Jr. (Grand Central, 2001); A Call to Conscience: The Landmark Speeches of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. (Warner Books, Inc., 2001); African American Lives: The Struggle for Freedom. Volumes I & II (Longman 2004); The Papers of Martin Luther King, Jr.. Volumes 1–4 (UC, 1992 – 2007); The Martin Luther King, Jr. Encyclopedia (Greenwood, 2008); This Light is Ours: Activist Photographs of the Civil Rights Movement (WW Norton & Co, 2009); Stride Toward Freedom: Montgomery Story (Beacon, 2010); Civil Rights Chronicle: The African-American Struggle for Freedom Publications International (2013); Martin's Dream: My Journey and the Legacy of Martin Luther King Jr. A Memoir (Palgrave, 2013);

As director of the MLK Research and Education Institute, Clayborne Carson, also hosted a screening of a documentary that he helped create called *I'm MLK*, *Jr*., and in 2021, he was asked by President joe Biden to serve as a member of the newly formed Civil rights Cold Case Records Review Board.

Carson has received numerous awards throughout his career, and also Honorary Doctorates from the Pacific Graduate School of Psychology (1995); Morehouse College (2007); Niagara University (2008); Westminster College (2015); as well as the Jamnalal Bajaj Foundation Award (2018).



Prof. & Hon. Dr Verne Harris is Acting Chief Executive of the Nel-son Mandela Foundation. He was Mandela's archivist from 2004 to 2013, directed the Foundation's archives programme for 15 years and the dialogue and advocacy programme for 5 years. He is an adjunct professor at the Nelson Mandela University. Prof Harris participated in a range of structures which transformed South Africa's apartheid archival landscape, including the Truth and Reconciliation Commission, and is a former Deputy Director of the National Archives. He has authored or co-authored six books.

The most recent book published, is *Ghosts of Archive* (2021). He is the recipient of honorary doctorates from the University of Cordoba (Argentina 2014) and the University of Pretoria (South Africa 2023), held the Follet Chair at Dominican University (Chicago) in 2018 - 2019, received archival publication awards from Australia, Canada and South Africa, and both his novels were short-listed for South Africa's M-Net Book Prize. He has served on the Boards of *Archival Science*, the Ahmed Kathrada Foundation, the Freedom of Expression Institute, and the South African History Archive.





Prof. Dr. Judith Margaret Brown is a retired academic from the UK. Born in India but educated in England, she taught in Cambridge, Manchester and Oxford. Her last post was as Beit Professor of Imperial and Global History in Oxford from 1990 to 2011. She is an Emeritus Professorial Fellow of Balliol College. Her academic links with South Africa go back to 1993. She has written widely on India in the 19th and 20th centuries, and on the South Asian diaspora. She has been a governor of a number of Universities in the UK and was a founder member of the Scholars' Council at the Library of Congress, Washington DC. She is also a Priest in the Church of England.

York: Oxford University Press (2001), with Louis, Wm. Roger (eds.).; Nehru: A Political Life, New Haven and London: Yale University Press (2005); and Global South Asians: Introducing the Modern Diaspora (New Approaches to Asian History.).



Dr. Elizabeth M. Williams is a historian and academic librarian and Heads up a team of Academic Support Librarians covering the 3 Colleges of the University of Edinburgh; the College of Science and Engineering, the College of Medicine and Veterinary Medicine, the College of Arts Humanities and the Social Sciences. These Colleges incorporate 20-plus Schools and there are a growing number of research centres and institutes. Williams specialises in Modern British history and its relationship with Africa, the Caribbean and the African Diaspora including Black Britain.

She focuses on Britain's relationship with South Africa and her book 'The Politics of Race in Britain and South Africa: Black British Solidarity with the Anti-Apartheid Struggle' examined this history (Bloomsbury, 2017). Williams also co-edits the new Taylor and Francis Journal Black Histories: Dialogues,

The next book, *Black Britain and Nelson Mandela: Pulling the Branch of a Tree* (Bloomsbury, London) will soon be released. Williams is a seasoned lecturer visiting Europe, Americas, the Middle East and Africa.



Dr. Johnny J. Mack is the Associate Director of the World House Project at the Center on Democracy, Development and the Rule of Law, housed in the Freeman Spogli Institute for International Studies at Stanford University. He has extensive experience in social change, community development, and international relations. His professional background includes serving as the director of the Martin Luther King, Jr. Center for Nonviolent Social Change, president of Nelson Mandela Family Foundation, and the Drum Major Institute president.

Dr. Mack studies social change, social movements, and human development. His research focus is subsumed in his seminal work "After Confrontation, Then What?" It rearticulates nonviolence beyond the traditional understanding of resistance to a meta-logic using Martin Luther King Jr.'s call to restructure the social edifice with a "revolution of values" through "peaceable power." The framework explains Dr. King's peaceable power as direct, structural, and cultural nonviolence with strategic, conscientious, and cultural action components. He, thus, argues nonviolence is a meta-logic, with direct, structural, and cultural forms that counter-pose Johan Galtung's seminal conflict and violence triangles. Dr. Mack constructs the counter-pose of violence and nonviolence as a spectrum or alternative paths of change as articulated in Martin Luther King, Jr.'s 1967 book *Where Do We Go from Here, Chaos or Community?*

Dr. Mack has worked throughout the Americas, Africa, the Middle East, Europe, and South Asia. His community and international relations work includes comprehensive community initiatives and community-based dialogue, education, and training programs on nonviolence, peace, and development. He organized Gen II, an international initiative that brought together the second generation of 20th-century peace icons, including Christine Chavez, Nadime Gemayel, Kerry Kennedy, Martin Luther King III, Dahlia Rabin, Naomi Tutu, and Justin Trudeau. He also designed and launched the initiative

"Realizing the Dream: Poverty in America Tour" with Martin Luther King, III. Over 24 months, the tour visited 40 communities across the United States, including urban and rural communities, Native American reservations, Appalachia, and the Gulf Coast. The tour concluded with a national conference, a report to the nation, and a documentary aired on American Life TV Network.

He is the lead facilitator of the National Police Foundation National Council on Police Reform and Race, and Co-Director of ACT NOW! the national initiative to reimagine community. He has served as a senior advisor on domestic policy to Search for Common Ground and as the Henry Hart Rice Fellow at the Jimmy and Rosaland Carter School for Conflict Analysis & Resolution at George Mason University where he earned a doctorate.



Rev. Dr. Allan Aubrey Boesak is a South African Black liberation theologian and global human rights activist. In his more than fifty years in Ministry, Dr. Boesak served the church in various ecumenical positions, including as Moderator of his church, Senior Vice President of the S.A. Council of Churches, and President of the World Alliance of Reformed Churches, WARC (now World Communion of Reformed Churches). Under his leadership the WARC declared apartheid a sin and a heresy and suspended the two white Dutch Reformed churches in South Africa for their moral and theological justification of the apartheid system.

In 1983, Dr. Boesak called for the formation of the United Democratic Front, which became the largest non-racial, non-violent political formation in the history of the country, mobilising millions of people in South Africa and abroad for the final onslaught on the apartheid system. Currently e is Professor of Black liberation theology and ethics at the University of Pretoria, Prof. Boesak is author of 28 books. His most recently published work includes *Children of the Waters of Meribah: Black Liberation Theology, the Miriamic Tradition and the Challenges of 21st Century Empire* (2019); and *Selfless Revolutionaries – Biko, Black Consciousness, Black Theology and a Global Ethic of Solidarity and Resistance* (2022). Most recently published: *The Fire, the River, and the Scorched Earth Between: Fifty Years of Black Liberation Theology through the Lens of Allan Boesak* (2023). He is the recipient of 14 honorary degrees and over 20 international awards including the Robert Kennedy Human Rights Award, the Martin Luther King Jr. Peace Award, and the King Hintsa Bravery Award from the Xhosa Royal House. In 2017, he was inducted into the Martin Luther King Jr International Board of Preachers, at Morehouse College, Atlanta Georgia, USA, so far the only African to be so honoured. In 2023, he came an inductee of the prestigious Circle of Prophetic Preachers and Advocates of Social Justice of Shaw University Divinity School.
